The Dutchman project is proposed to be located in Converse County, WY and is planned to have a **capacity of up to 499 MW**. The project will also integrate on-site energy storage.

When a solar project's life is complete, the project is removed, the site is turned to its original condition, and the majority of the **components are recycled.**



The Dutchman Renewable Power Project is expected to create **250-350 jobs** during construction.



The Dutchman Renewable Power Project is expected to generate more than \$200 million in financial stimulus to the region, including local tax revenue and direct economic output, over the life of the project.



Our solar projects are **safe and quiet**. Panels are secured to posts that are driven into the ground **without concrete.** This not only reduces impacts on the land but also makes for simple land restoration at the end of the project's life.



In addition to the jobs created during construction, we'll be hiring to fill approximately **3-5 long-term careers** in operations and maintenance.



Solar projects provide **meaningful economic value** through tax revenue and job creation without a costly burden on public services and infrastructure (i.e., roads or water access).



Following feedback from the local community, the western project boundary has been moved more than 500 feet east of WY-95.
